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program. So they go into the program but then you will see back on page 7 that if the offender is uncooperative or is found not to be amenable to treatment, now I don't know what...how that relates to appropriate in the first sense in getting into the program, but they say if he is found not amenable to treatment, then the bureaucrats can throw him out of the program. And, remember, they can throw out of the program without further review an individual that the court has said, you shall be in the program. So what this amendment would say is, if the court has said that this individual shall be in the program, then it would seem to me to be appropriate that the court should review the dismissal of the individual from the program by the department. Otherwise, I think what you will get is the possibility that the court will say you're supposed to be in the program and the department can say, well, we never thought he should be in the program anyway and so on down the line a little bit you find out that he's not amenable to treatment or he's being noncooperative. So I would simply give back to the court the power to review those situations where they have said, themselves, in the first instance, that there should be treatment. That's all this little amendment does.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Does anyone wish to speak to this amendment? Senator Kristensen.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Thank you, Madam President, members of the body, Senator Beutler, just so I can understand, is this AM2533?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Yes, it is.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Okay. And, as I look at this, what you're doing here is saying that the treatment, if it was ordered by the court, that you would have to go back to the court if you don't get in.

SENATOR BEUTLER: If they decide to kick you out of the program then you have to go back to the court before they can kick you out of the program.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: By kicking out, you mean not getting in?

SENATOR BEUTLER: No. The court, in the first instance, has ordered you into the program.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Okay.
