fact, since there is no secret agenda, I have no difficulty accepting this. John and I have acknowledged that it presents an interesting problem because by striking the language one might say, ah well, now we know what they really want. Well, the truth of the matter is that it got put in here to answer an objection that was superfluous to begin with, or specious to begin with. And it's probably appropriate to take it out. In fact, I think John has acted quite honorably in being the moving party, because I would not make the motion to strike this myself given the fact that there have been these political charges back and forth. In fact, the language probably doesn't belong in the bill, is unnecessary, and was intended to have a prophylactic intention, which in the event John and those supporters that we have understand why this is being struck, is totally unnecessary, I support the amendment.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Landis. Senator Crosby. Okay. Does anyone else wish to speak to this amendment? Seeing none, do you have closing, Senator Lindsay?

SENATOR LINDSAY: Yes, Madam President. I would just add that if Senator Landis has indicated that he has no secret agenda, and I have no double secret agenda, so I would just move the amendment.

ASSISTANT CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays on the adoption of Senator Lindsay's amendment.

ASSISTANT CLERK: Madam President, the next amendment I have is from Senator Lindsay as well. This is AM2583, Senator.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Lindsay.
