SENATOR ROBAK: I move we adjourn until tomorrow morning at 9:00 a.m. I withdraw that.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Robak. Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: I've just asked John to add the words "reasonably available". If he will do that I will accept the amendment. It's the last amendment and we can vote on advancement. We can do this in five minutes.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Landis. Does anyone else wish to speak to this amendment? Seeing none, do you have closing, Senator Lindsay? Senator Lindsay.

SENATOR LINDSAY: Yes. I would ask to withdraw the last amendment and substitute the one that is on the desk.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Madam President, Senator Lindsay would move to amend. (Read Lindsay substitute amendment. See page 574 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Lindsay.

SENATOR LINDSAY: Thank you, Madam President. This is the language that Senator Landis just referred to. This tightens it up a little bit so that we're not talking about notifying, as Senator Landis said, somebody who is off in the Peace Corps or in some other continent. It simply asks that somebody who is reasonably available by telephone, by whatever, it tightens that up a little bit so that we're not looking all over the globe for people. I'd urge the adoption of the amendment.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Lindsay. Does anyone else wish to speak to this? Seeing none, we will vote on the Lindsay amendment. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 33 ayes, 0 nays, Madam President, on adoption of Senator Lindsay's amendment.

PRESIDENT MOUL: The amendment is adopted.
