SENATOR MOORE: No.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, thank you. Members of the Legislature, I think on this bill the more appropriate term would be that you represent "Jane Filtertip" because the tobacco industry is gaining more new smokers among young women than any other group, than any other group, and that is based on statistics. Is Senator Elmer here? Senator Elmer, I want you to help me with something because you are an expert on farm chemicals. Senator Elmer, Owen, Senator Elmer...
