SENATOR R. JOHNSON: It's a voluntary...if you want to check your drinking water on your farm, for example, your homestead at your farm, yeah, that's about the only....There are no requirements for that.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Under this bill there would be, is that correct?

SENATOR R. JOHNSON: No, I'm not suggesting that. I'm saying that...

SENATOR ROBINSON: Probably, though.

SENATOR R. JOHNSON: No, no, sir. What I'm suggesting is that if there is contamination out there, I may or may not know about it if I'm living on my homestead because I don't have any programs...

SPEAKER BAACK: Time.

SENATOR R. JOHNSON: ...that govern...governing me. What we're trying to get to is prevention of pollution of our groundwater.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Robinson. Senator Lowell Johnson.

SENATOR L. JOHNSON: I yield my time to Senator Schmit, please.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Thank you, Senator Johnson. Just like to call your attention to the fiscal note in the bill, somewhere between \$75,000 for one year, and 249,000 for both fiscal year '92-93, '93-94. Ladies and gentlemen, that is the first program that I know of in many years where the cost has gone down in 20 years. The first proposal is two-thirds of a million dollars of federal money, if you buy the program. Twenty years later the cost is 149,000 for two years. Ladies and gentlemen, that is some kind of record. Now, the other question is, at its first implementation the feds were going to pay for the first year. I asked who was going to pay the second, they said, well, then you're on your own. My question is, Senator Rogers, who's going to pay for this bill, Senator Rogers? Where is the money going
