

That's pretty effective in terms of bringing people who have been pulled over, stopped and ticketed for DWI, in terms of whether or not they're found guilty. Ninety-seven out of 100 are found guilty of driving while under the influence. And with regard to the issue of what happens on...what percentage, I guess, of...and whether or not our current DWI statutes have worked, it was also testified to the fact that in Douglas County, the most heavily populated county, the most amount of traffic in this state with regard to motor vehicles that are on the road, which is going to mean there are probably going to be the highest percentage of individuals who might be driving after having some alcohol, that the representative amount is 4 percent, 4 percent of all the fatalities that took place in Douglas County were alcohol related, 4 percent. Now I wish that was zero, and I wish there were zero percent fatalities. I don't want anybody to die in an automobile accident. And I don't want anybody who's been drinking alcohol to cause that accident, or to die in an accident themselves. But the fact of the matter is look at the statistics. The system we have in place right now is working. Maybe there are some things we should look at. I'm not opposed to that. I'm not of the opinion that LB 291 in some areas probably doesn't have some merit and that the bill probably is going to pass. None of the amendments that I have proposed are anything less than substantive. They all deal with policy questions, they all need to be debated. We don't need to sign on to them blindly, nor do we need to sign onto the committee amendments blindly and say that we've done something that's going to make our system better. You don't come in here, ladies and gentlemen, and double the penalty, double the jail time without cause. There's been no cause shown, there has been no cause shown. Then we put in place a system called ALR, automatic license revocation, that says you're guilty until you prove yourself innocent. And you don't prove yourself innocent in the courts. You prove yourself innocent to a hearing officer, a hearing officer. And Senator Beyer talks about backlog, you want to see backlog, we all know individuals, and as a whole I commend the law enforcement profession, they are a tremendous group of people. But in this...and they have an extremely difficult job. Dealing with individuals like me on a day-to-day basis is tough. I mean talk about dealing with somebody who is under the influence, it would have to be murder. And they deal with all forms and all walks of life when they're out there, risking their lives, literally, to protect us. But, ladies and gentlemen, they're human, too. And if you think that ALR...
