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mitigate punishments to bring about equality and fairness, aggravate all of them. But here's the question I want to ask you. If a minor is stopped with .10 in his or her blood, what will the charge be?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: I'm assuming that they are convicted for driving while intoxicated and they would be subject to license revocation under the present penalties.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And could they also be charged with this Class III misdemeanor offense?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: No, because the last sentence on Section 20 through 23 says, a violation of this section shall be considered a lesser included offense.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, see, that relates to one who is renting property if you read it carefully and the minor is not one who is renting property to others, a landlord.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Okay, I...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Is that what this says?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: Tell me how you get to there.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, what is a lessor, l-e-s-s-o-r? A lessee is one who rents from; the lessor is the one who rents to. So if this is a lessor offense that we're talking about, we've injected real estate transactions into this too, haven't we?

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: An you have just insulted the bill drafter beyond belief for a minor misspelling. I'm sure that the next bill you have, Senator Chambers, that Senator Beutler will carefully read that and search out that error for you.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, Senator Kristensen, this is not an insult to the bill drafter. This is a serious discussion of a bill that is before you and what you have read repeatedly apparently. This is your baby. This is what you are trying to do to the young people and anybody can make a misspelling or a typographical error, but you should catch it. We've been discussing this all morning so I'm going to lay it on you right at your doorstep and, members of the Legislature, when Senator
