PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Wesely. We will now vote on the motion to advance LB 906. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted on the motion to advance LB 906? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Madam President, on the advancement of LB 906.

PRESIDENT MOUL: LB 906 is advanced. LB 971.

CLERK: LB 971 introduced by Senators Schrock, Coordsen, Dierks, Rod Johnson, and Wehrbein. (Read title.) The bill was introduced on January 9, referred to Agriculture, advanced to General File. I have no amendments to the bill, Madam President.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Madam President and members of the Legislature, LB 971 has to do with filling a vacancy on the Corn Checkoff Board. Right now there are nine members on the board. Eight of them are appointed by the Governor to serve on a regional basis divided up according to equal production. The ninth one, at the present time, is selected by the other eight board members but we have a problem in the statute that is not clear as to what happens when the at large position is vacated.
