had on committee makeup and those kinds of things are those that affect the Legislative Council. Now if we move to put into statute the structure of the Legislature itself and the various committees, certainly I imagine that's something that can be done. But, on the other hand, it will be a departure from allowing the Legislature the flexibility to make adjustments in its operation through rules and regs that are adopted by the Legislature rather than the route of needing to introduce a bill for legislation to be enacted when any change is proposed. It seems to me that not arguing the merits of the amendment to the amendment, it seems to me that it's appropriate to retain the flexibility and the ability for the Legislature itself, through its own rules, those things that affect the operation of the Legislature, it seems appropriate that those be retained with our historical way of dealing with those issues through rules rather than starting to put some of these things into statute, which obviously has much less flexibility than does the rules, and always puts us in the position if the Legislature should want to change some portion of the rules, during the course of a session, would be in the position to have to do it through statute rather than simply going...the process now of going through the Rules Committee, coming back with their recommendations and voting to accept or reject, or to amend those provisions. So I think that it would be desirable not to start the route of putting into statute what we have historically covered with legislative rules. But the committee amendment deals with the Legislative Council, and to some that may seem to be a fine line of distinction, but nevertheless it's one that we have historically followed, and I think probably ought to continue to follow and address the standing committees through our rules, as we have historically done.
