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area is already being fairly represented, or if you just don't care to look at it, then you vote against it. But I think there's a lot more to it than just saying this isn't the proper way to go about doing it. It goes much deeper than that. I'd urge the adoption of the amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Lindsay. Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I just wanted to reiterate I'm not attempting to make an argument as to how the committees ought to be organized, merely it's a major change to go to statute for the organization of the Legislature internally, with what we currently, historically, have done under rules. I think it's been an acceptable way. I don't object to those who have an interest in making this a vehicle to discuss the argument of how committees could be made up, that's fine. But as a matter of precedent, as a matter of legislative internal policy, maybe we ought to keep Legislative Council separate, the organization of the Legislature separate, and deal with the organization of the Legislature as we have historically done through the rules process, because once we start the statute course that will be done time and time again, in all probability. It takes away from the body the ability to react to what should be rule changes, which, in some instances, need to be done when...perhaps when we're not in session. But in Special Session where you can adopt rules, maybe you wouldn't have it in the call, and you wouldn't know that there was a statutory provision that needed to be adjusted, couldn't be done. That's an unlikely event, but it could happen. But, in any event, I would retain...I don't object to the argument, but it ought to be made in the framework which we have historically done, that's through the rules, not through the statutes that covers only the Legislative Council.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Warner. Senator Conway, you're next.

SENATOR CONWAY: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members. In somewhat of a response to Senator Lindsay's talking about mathematics and numbers, with that I'd rise. One of the reasons the Government Committee advanced the proposal that we did was simply for codification purposes. And as you now have out on your desk, you can see the breakdown of Executive Board, and did not expect to focus on the Committee on Committee's realignment as well, as Senator Lynch has proposed.
