SENATOR LINDSAY: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and thank you, Mr. Clerk. That's what the amendment does, it adds the same language to the check situation, that is that you can only aggregate the checks into one offense rather than into multiple offenses. I tried to get this amendment included in the last floor amendment but the amendment...the floor amendment wasn't debated long enough to get it written up. So I'm adding it onto this. They both deal with the same language. One adds the language to the bill itself, one adds the language to the checks. It simply deals with if you're going to aggregate, you can only aggregate once. I showed the language to Senator Kristensen. He indicated that he didn't have a problem with this language in this amendment that we're talking with as long as I got into the record the question of that this deals with one jurisdiction and that's certainly the case. I believe this adds right onto a sentence that refers to checks written in one jurisdiction. So you wouldn't have to aggregate all checks written in the State of Nebraska, this goes from jurisdiction to jurisdiction. I would move the adoption of the amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Lindsay. Any discussion on the amendment to the amendment by Senator Lindsay? Seeing none, we will vote on the amendment to the amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. We are voting on the amendment to the amendment. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of Senator Lindsay's amendment to his amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: The amendment to the amendment is adopted. We are now back to the Lindsay amendment as amended. Any further discussion on the Lindsay amendment? Senator Lindsay, do you wish to close?

SENATOR LINDSAY: I would simply urge the adoption of the amendment. It does simply provide for if you're going to aggregate, you only do it once rather than trying to split the deck into as many different hands as possible. I would urge the adoption of the amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: You've heard Senator Lindsay's closing on his amendment. We will now vote on the amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Record, Mr. Clerk.
