CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of Senator Cudaback's amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: The amendment is adopted. The next item, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Will would move to amend the bill.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Will.

SENATOR WILL: What page?

CLERK: It's not printed, Senator. It's on page...the language reads, on page 3, line 1...on page 3, line 1, strike "shall" and insert "may".

SENATOR WILL: I would like to withdraw that amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: It is withdrawn.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Lindsay would move to amend. Senator, AM2715. I believe you have distributed copies to the members. (The Lindsay amendment appears on page 840 of the Legislative Journal.)

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Lindsay.

SENATOR LINDSAY: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and members, AM2715 was passed around to you. It should be on your desk. The amendment would do two things. The first thing would change the...the amounts necessary for classification. Those amounts are what Senator Kristensen and I talked about a little bit and those are, I think, the concerns that Senator Pirsch will have with this amendment. These amounts have not been adjusted in 13 years. To pick up, since Senator Pirsch last asked me some of those questions, I've gotten the figures on it. The Consumer Price Index, 1979 dollars, \$100 in 1979, it would be \$155 in 1989. It does not include adjustments in the last three years since then. But that gives a rough idea of how much things have gone up. An example in the top...top line of this, or the top bracket of this moves it from 1,000 to 1,500. As I mentioned to Senator Pirsch, that we took roughly the CPI, Consumer Price Index, and then rounded it. In this case, it was rounded
