PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. We will proceed with Select File, LB 928.

CLERK: LB 928, I have E & R amendments, first of all, Senator Will.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Will.

SENATOR WILL: Madam President, I move for the adoption of the E & R amendments to LB 928.

PRESIDENT MOUL: You have heard the motion to adopt the E & R amendments. All those in favor please say aye. Opposed nay. The E & R amendments are adopted.

CLERK: Madam President, Senator Schimek would move to amend the bill. (See AM2908 on page 867 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, Madam President and members of the body, thank you very much. What I would like to do is talk about an amendment that I filed on this bill and on the next bill, which is Senator Nelson's bill, which also talks about parking and spaces designated for disabled persons. I intend to withdraw both of these motions, but the reason that I am bringing them forward is because I believe that we seriously need to go back and look at these statutes regarding handicapped parking. Almost any time that we have a bill on the floor that deals with this issue, we have suggested amendments, and I think maybe it is time to go in and do somewhat of a study on these statutes. The sense of my amendments, one on 928, would be any person who knowingly provides false information in an application...for use of an application for a permit shall be subject to a fine of not to exceed \$500. This apparently is a problem of people who either provide false information or who hang onto a permit long after they are eligible for a permit. I am not certain that this is the best way to counteract that, and perhaps there needs to be more careful observation and follow-up on those who actually have a permit, and maybe that is the bigger problem. At least I have been told that is the bigger problem than actually providing false information. The one, the amendment I
