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primary election. I intend to pursue this issue. Senator Wehrbein has indicated that he would be happy to look at it anyway, and so we may be back next year with some kind of an amendment. Even if we passed this one this year, it would not affect this election cycle. So there is no problem really with waiting and looking at the matter more carefully and coming back next year. So, thank you for your time.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: And I would like to withdraw the amendment. Thank you. Senator Wehrbein was a little nervous.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you for clarifying that, Senator Schimek. Is there anything further on the bill, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: Madam President, Senator Beutler would move to amend the bill. (See AM2917 on page 870 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Beutler.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Madam President, members of the Legislature, I thought I would just say this amendment clarifies the bill and let it go at that, but I am not sure I have the same kind of credibility that Senator Wehrbein has. This little amendment, though, doesn't do much. It's...I have talked to the Senator about it. Basically, it strikes Section 19-420 in the statutes, which is one of those statutes relating to the commission form of government, which I just ran across when I was looking back to see what the bill did. And the reason I am suggesting that it be stricken is because it is blatantly unconstitutional. It is an old 1929 statute. I don't think there is anybody that would argue that it is constitutional. Has to do with free speech. I passed it out to you and you can look at it but, basically, it would preclude the janitor at the Nebraska City city building from trying to convince the mayor that he should change his political affiliation, or to try to insert political influence on him, which is just something that the courts have long ago said is not possible. So I am just suggesting that we strike that particular section while we are in this section of statutes. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Wehrbein.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes, Madam Speaker, members, I will support
