officials make that decision. They know how much it costs. They ought to charge what it costs. And if it is \$7 now, it should be \$7. If it is \$14 in five years, it probably ought to be \$14. We ought to, in my estimation, Senator, we ought to allow the locally elected government officials the same authority that other locally elected government officials have in this state.
