

reason that this is, it would be ready for identification. In the case of accidents these are many times emergency systems that you could readily identify that this person was a donor. The donor in the amendment also looks at the final decision of an organ or an issue donation is still subject to the consent of legal next of kin or guardian at the time or any other person that is authorized or under obligation to dispose of the body. This is another...it won't automatically be done because you make out the application. What it does is it indicates your wishes and then that will also need to be granted at the time of the person that is responsible again, for the disposal of the body. Another change in this bill over before, before it looked at least 19 years of age was in the language. This will include anyone who is applying for a driver's license which would be young people and we found that more and more young people are interested in this program and would like an opportunity to participate. One of the other main changes you need to look at is we're looking at tissue along with organ and then of course if you would wish to donate your whole body for study. This bill, I believe, gives the state just a prime opportunity to look at citizens that are willing to make a huge contribution to their fellow man and you have what I consider one of the greatest gifts anyone could give to someone else other than perhaps laying down their life to say I'm willing to give, in the future, part of my body to extend someone else's life. The state can help facilitate and enter into this process and can help at a very, very nominal cost by facilitating that process by putting a system in place that better enables that donor and that eventual person that is going to need some assistance and can do it at a very nominal cost. There is a fiscal note and that fiscal note was on the original bill, not as it is amended. At one time it was thought to be helpful when we were putting this bill together that the Department of Health would keep records and stats. That's not necessarily we found necessary and that it goes into an entire National Organ Retrieval information System. So that part has been deleted from the bill, but the fiscal note has not been changed and so the fiscal note actually would be about 20 to \$25,000 and that would be for the additional people that would be needed or any additional expenses that the Department of Motor Vehicles would incur as far as being recording and having all these statistics at the Department of Motor Vehicles. The other thing that I would like to mention is this process will not take place until the Department of Motor Vehicles has a new system in place for designing a new driver's license. It will not create or require
