

face. The inventory is what is going to kill the small person and it's going to kill agriculture, not the other way around. That's the ultimate danger, that's the reason I think you need to change the Constitution. And if we want to have a debate on do we need to change or not, that's what I think it ought to be. But for my purposes, if you don't change the Constitution, you then sentence...

PRESIDENT MOUL: Time.

SENATOR KRISTENSEN: ...the small person to a terrible economic crisis in the state.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Kristensen. Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Madam President, members of the Legislature, my comments will be brief and primarily, I think, if I understood Senator Schmit's comments. I talked about what I vision will happen if we fail to amend the Constitution as provided in 219 because as Senator Kristensen has pointed out just now so well, there are many provisions of the Constitution that has to be altered and changed to address the issue that you want. But if my comments earlier relative to the economy, and if I used the word business as if to exclude agriculture, then my comments were taken wrong because agriculture is a big business in Nebraska. Yes, it's got a lot of other attributes as well, but it is a business and the hardship that the economy will suffer applies to everything if we fail to amend the Constitution properly and we have everything on at market value. It's been said many times livestock contract feeding will end, there won't be any in Nebraska and that's, I don't recall the percentage, Senator Wehrbein or others maybe do, but it's a substantial number of the livestock. It's a substantial number of bushels of corn that are marketed through those livestock, not necessarily from their...well, from all of area farmers, that's going to leave the state. I'm convinced, yes, the Constitution has to be amended, but it also has to be amended correctly because if you fail to do it correctly, we haven't moved, we haven't changed and we are all at market value and you'll have no option. I'd urge the amendment be adopted and the bill be advanced when we get to that point.
