SENATOR ELMER: Thank you, Madam President and members, this is even easier to support than LB 1120 was because it does address a very fair method of returning tax dollars collected at the state level to the local citizens. Every one of us had the same number of people residing in our districts which represents about the same number of homesteads or households. So this type of taxation return is basically fair and does help pay for the operation of schools and other government services, of course, in a much more general manner than we had before. And it does do what we would like to see done, or at least begins to, rather than retreating to an obsolete anachronism as far as taxing is concerned in the personal property that is, on its face, unfair and unable to be done evenly and proportionately no matter how hard you try that this is a much preferable way to proceed and I'd urge your support for Senator Hall's amendment.
