SPEAKER BAACK: Time.

Lose all the votes in Nebraska would not amount to very many votes insofar as dairymen are concerned, but the facts are that someone needs to represent them and someone needs to point out their position and the fact that they are not being taken care of under this bill. In fact, they are being...

SPEAKER BAACK: Time, Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: ...victimized and they do not deserve it. I ask you to support the amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Moore, you are next.

SENATOR MOORE: Mr. Speaker and members, this morning Senator Warner gave one of his speeches you could understand pretty clearly, which I always tend to listen to those very closely because, one, they are easy to understand, and, two, that means he is saying something, and this morning he was saying something very clearly about the differing effects, if those in agriculture think they are getting a raw deal, you ought to compare the numbers.
