

PRESIDENT MOUL: We were in closing, Senator Schmit, so we will now proceed with the vote on the motion to suspend rules. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 32 ayes, 5 nays, Madam President, on the motion to suspend the rules.

PRESIDENT MOUL: The motion is approved. We have suspended rules. We are now voting on the Lindsay-Lamb amendment as amended. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 33 ayes, 3 nays, Madam President, on adoption of Senator Lindsay and Lamb's amendment as amended.

PRESIDENT MOUL: The amendment is approved.

CLERK: Madam President, I have a priority motion. That priority motion is that Senator Warner would move for a cloture pursuant to Rule 7, Section 10.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Warner. All right, it is nondebatable. Senator Hall.

SENATOR HALL: Point of order, Madam President. I also have up there a priority motion to reconsider the vote on the Lindsay amendment.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Hall, I would like to ask for an explanation for your request.

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Madam President. Madam President, the rule to reconsider a...reconsider a vote is a priority motion. It takes precedence over every motion except for a motion to adjourn. The rule...the motion for cloture is a priority motion, it takes precedence over every motion except the motion to adjourn. The rules are in conflict. They're filed simultaneously and I would ask for a ruling from the Chair with regard to which motion would take priority. According to the Roberts Rules of Order, the motion to reconsider a vote is a special motion. It takes precedent over a subsidiary motion which the motion to limit debate, that being cloture, would fall behind it. And I would ask for a ruling from the Chair whether a motion to reconsider, which is a priority motion and by our
