

what that standard should be. That ought to be the debate that you have on what sort of standard or classification can you have with exemptions to the Constitution, or with any other law that you are going to pass in the Constitution. I don't think you should put this date in there, and then in concrete make two different standards, those exemptions that were enacted prior to December 31st of 1992, that lived under the uniformity clause, and those exemptions that will live under the special legislation requirements after December 31st of 1992. And I would certainly urge, and I see Senator Lindsay, I'd be interested to see what his response to the amendment to the amendment, but I certainly think this sets up two different standards that will cause us a lot of problem in the future. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Kristensen. Senator Warner, followed by Senators Wehrbein, Hall, and Schmit. Senator Warner.

SENATOR WARNER: Madam President, members of the Legislature, I would rise to support the amendment to the amendment, as well, and for all of the reasons that has been given by Senator Kristensen and that is that you would not have two standards in the Constitution that was governed by a date. I do think I should add a couple of other comments, however. Senator Lindsay raised this issue on General File. He told us about it. It is not at the last minute, and certainly it is true that, in my opinion, others differ, that without a constitutional amendment, all property is on the tax rolls, it is as of now. And unless you belong to those who believe that you can exempt under the current Constitution all personal property, which I do not, unless you believe that, then you have no choice if you want to have personal property treated in any fashion other than at market value, you have to be supportive of a constitutional amendment to permit that treatment, and I would support the amendment to the amendment striking the concept of a date, so that the provisions of the Constitution would apply to existing legislation, as well as anything that might be done in the future. We should not have two standards different only by a date.
