was followed, discretion was used, and I think the process worked very, very well. I just wanted to add that clarification, that addition to what Senator Haberman was saying. And with that, I also support the amendment by Senator Conway, and I appreciate him bringing it to us in this manner this morning.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Bernard-Stevens. Does anyone else wish to speak to this amendment? Seeing none, do you have closing, Senator Conway?

SENATOR CONWAY: Very briefly. Again, one of the concerns is that we do this with an E clause attached for the purposes of having it effective before the primary, and obviously for the election commissioners to be cognizant of any of these changes as they prepare ballots and have a designated place on the ballot for signatures and the like, before we experience another election. So, this amendment is offered with an E clause.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Conway. We'll now vote on the Conway amendment to LB 424. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted on the Conway amendment? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Madam President, on adoption of Senator Conway's amendment.

PRESIDENT MOUL: The amendment is adopted. Mr. Clerk, further amendments.

CLERK: Senator Lindsay would move to amend, Madam President. The amendment is on page 261 of the Journal.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Wesely.

SENATOR WESELY: Thank you, Madam President. I... I realize now what the Lindsay amendment is. He did discuss this with me. The original bill called for acknowledging on petitions, initiative petitions, that a person circulating that petition is a paid circulator. We didn't include that provision for, I think, recall petitions, or referendum petitions. And so Senator Lindsay is making that across-the-board, and adding that language elsewhere. And it's an oversight, and I think we should adopt this amendment. So, I would move to adopt the Lindsay amendment.
