

SENATOR WARNER: Well, it remains on.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Yeah. And what recourses would the Legislature have?

SENATOR WARNER: That's where there is, you know, disagreement, Senator Robinson, as to whether or not anything can be done under the current Constitution or not. I'm of the opinion that we can do nothing with personal property without amending the Constitution. There are those who believe the current language allows to exempt everything. I do not share that viewpoint.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Okay, thank you. I think there's another thing we should...another area we should talk about is that if the votes aren't there in November, I think there's a good chance they could be there in May. And what's going to happen to the senators in the urban areas? How are they going to look at the situation? I think I can give you a pretty good idea how they're going to look at it. They're going to...I think they're going to look at it in a much more negative way than they...than they are now. I think they could be much more severe than they have been, because whether we like it or not as rural senators, they could put the rural area to their knees if they wanted to. You know it and I know it. And I've heard a few senators say, well, we need chaos in this Chamber. Let me tell you folks, we weren't put down here to create chaos. We were put down here to represent our districts, and if need be to look above our districts. And I think it's about time we take a good look and reconsider your vote on this, because, believe me folks, in November it could be a much, much more severe game.

PRESIDENT MOUL: One minute.

SENATOR ROBINSON: And probably what would...I...I can hear some of the answers now from some of our urban colleagues, says, well, we gave you a chance, you didn't go with us. And I know there are some senators that are leaving for the last time, and I have great respect for those people. But I...one thing you still have to remember, life goes on in Nebraska. And if you want that rural area to have a chance to continue to thrive and to continue that great environment that we have in rural Nebraska, I think it's incumbent on us to...to support this issue and get to...get 40 votes and move it on to the May election. I'd urge you to reconsider your vote, take a good look at it, and have three or four of us amongst us to change
