I mean, in some ways, maybe I prefer so many feet as to the room because the room is somewhat of... obviously, if the thought is just where a door is, obviously, in most restaurants there's not doors there and so the definition of room is kind of evasive at best. But that's the reason I oppose the amendment. It's one of those things that the body simply has to come to grips with how much are we willing to do? How far do we want to go? I think it's only to remind the amendment... though the Moore amendment has been chastised by Senator Chambers, and I understand his feelings there, you have to understand with that amendment I think we went a long ways towards getting a bill but I think the vast majority of this body can pass and make a significant step in eliminating access to vending machines to minors without totally eliminating the business and without totally eliminating adults' ability to use such vending machines when they choose to smoke in a licensed liquor establishment or things like that. And so I think that 130, in its present form, is something that I can be proud of doing something. Obviously, it does not go as far as Senator Schimek, the original introducer of the bill, or as Senator Chambers maybe would like to go, but as we work through on bills we have to understand what can we get that the vast majority of the body can sign off on. I think LB 130, in its present form, is something that I certainly don't have a problem with. As a matter of fact, I think it's something if you eliminate half of vending machines in the State of Nebraska and significantly limit where minors will have access to vending machines, I think it's something that is a step forward, that we can be proud of in doing something. Obviously, if your goal is to eliminate smoking, eliminate vending machines, LB 130 certainly falls short of that. But I think, in its present form, it's something that can be passed and signed into law. And it's doing something. I'm not saying it's going to totally eliminate minors' ability to purchase cigarettes. It will not do that, neither would the bill in its original form, would not do that; neither will the bill with this amendment do things like that. And I think we have a reasonable bill now. I applaud Senator Schimek for trying to tighten the bill up even further. Obviously, the
