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legalization of marijuana. Let me ask him a question. Senator Moore, I would like to ask you a question. And I think this is appropriate because we are dealing with an addictive substance. Are you in favor of legalizing marijuana?

SENATOR MOORE: No, I'm not.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you think marijuana addicts as many people as tobacco?

SENATOR MOORE: I don't know the answer to that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you think that marijuana causes the death of as many people as cigarettes?

SENATOR MOORE: I...I would...I don't know the...I would assume not.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It doesn't. Then why are you opposed to the legalization of marijuana?

SENATOR MOORE: Because it, historically, has not been legal in this country and I don't think it should be.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So you're not looking at the damage or harm that it would cause but just tradition. Is that what your reason is?

SENATOR MOORE: Tradition, in my own mind, but I think it leads to.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What do you think it leads to?

SENATOR MOORE: I think it leads to further drug abuse on harder drugs.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And that's what they have indicated happens with some people who smoke cigarettes. But if the hard...let me ask you this question so it won't seem like I'm taking you around a long circle. If one substance is harmful, substance A is harmful, and substance B is harmful, and substance A kills 50 times as many people as substance B, and one of them is to be legal, would you want the one legal that kills the largest number of people, or the one that kills the smaller number?
