And so, with that, I probably will not support the amendment. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Schellpeper. Senator Ashford.

SENATOR ASHFORD: Thank you, Madam President, and members. Senator Schimek, could you just refresh my...Senator Schimek, could...would you...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, Senator Ashford.

SENATOR ASHFORD: ...would you refresh my memory now as to where we are with this bill? What...where does it stand now? What are we prohibiting and what are we not prohibiting?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay, basically, we are prohibiting vending machines except in places that are generally not open to the public. This would be like an office or a factory where generally teenagers, for instance, young people are not going to have access to those vending machines. And the second place, the second exception is into the...is in the licensed premises for liquor. So this could be in a bar or a restaurant.

SENATOR ASHFORD: Okay, thank you, Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: You're welcome.

SENATOR ASHFORD: So I guess I'm having a hard time making sense out of this debate. The concern that I have is there seems to be an obvious solution here and we're not taking that road and I'm sure it is because the tobacco law being the...maybe the vending machine lobby don't want us to take that road.
