PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Labeledz. We are accepting call-in votes.

SENATOR CROSBY: (Microphone not activated) because I'm 100 percent Irish and I sent around cookies earlier but you notice I didn't put green frosting on them, because I knew we were just going to be greened out today. CLERK: Senator Baack voting yes.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Would the senators please return to the Chambers and record their presence. The house is under call. Okay, Senator Beutler, please return to the Chambers.

CLERK: Senator Wesely voting yes. Senator Bernard-Stevens voting yes.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 1 nay to adopt Senator Schimek's amendment, Madam President.

PRESIDENT MOUL: The amendment is adopted, and I will raise the call. The next amendment, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Madam President, the next amendment is by Senator Hall. It's on pages 1321.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Will.

SENATOR WILL: Thank you, Madam President, members of the body, I'm substituting for Senator Hall and introducing this amendment. This amendment is on page 1321. If you recall, there is a portion of the bill at this point that states essentially that there is a local control provision that nothing in the bill, as written, precludes any local governing body from establishing and enforcing ordinances at least as stringent or more stringent than the...than the current provisions of LB 130. Senator Hall has introduced an amendment that essentially would reverse that and say that this act shall supersede any present
