

not just cafeteria. It isn't through just the cafeteria. It would be about 140 per month being trained throughout the whole vocational program, vocational rehab program.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: In restaurants and in the cafe...so you can't tell me how many there are actually in the cafeteria being trained per month.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: No, I can't, six or seven. I've been told it's six or seven.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: A month. Well, I guess my question is then, if we're training seven or eight people now per month, and that doesn't seem like very many, but I guess...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: In the cafeteria only.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...in the cafeteria, and if we can save money by not having that program in the cafeteria, and I'm hearing \$100,000, is that correct?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Well, that's what it's about subsidized, I understand, from the Department of Education approximately.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: So then how many more would we be able to train in the restaurants throughout town and would the restaurants be able to absorb more?

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: We've been assured that there are plenty of spots for training across, around town and that this simply utilizes our resources more effectively without having any impact on the vocational rehabilitation program.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: So would we double the amount of people we're training? Would we triple the amount of people we're training...

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Well, because we put the match money in at the General Fund level, we will be able to continue federal funds which we'll be able to continue the training program, however the dollars were to be used.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Say that again.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Because we have put the General Fund match in
