

and criminal liability. And then on page 14, on line 19, we strike those lines 21 through 25 and put in a more defined, more closely defined type of cases, that any such alcohol or drug test may be used for. And that would be 28-306, motor vehicle homicide, and 39-669.07, driving under the influence. I urge that you vote for the adoption of the committee amendments, and then the advancement of this bill.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Pirsch. Senator Hefner, on the committee amendments.

SENATOR HEFNER: Mr. Speaker and members of the body, I rise to support the committee amendments. The committee amendments strikes the liability section. This is Section 3, and it also changes the wording and clarifies the bill a little bit more. So I would encourage you to support the committee amendments, and then after we adopt them, why then I will explain the bill. Thank you.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Hefner. Senator Schimek, on the committee amendments.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. Senator Pirsch, can I ask you a quick question.

SENATOR PIRSCH: It was regarding certain qualifications and, of course, across state lines, that kind of jurisdiction, and we have to, as a state, qualify those who would be taking those tests who are not within the State of Nebraska.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: So they would go through a certifying process?

SENATOR PIRSCH: No, not necessarily, but they would have to have the same certification, regulation, and licensing that our
