SENATOR HALL: Yeah, thank you, Mr. President, members. Senator Robinson, I would have, it's Senator Wehrbein's amendment, and I speak in favor of it because...

SENATOR ROBINSON: Yeah.

SENATOR HALL: ...I've spoken in favor and have carried the legislation before with him. But I would have no problem with that. I think it would have to read...

SENATOR ROBINSON: Okay.

SENATOR HALL: ...somewhere along the lines of no more than one year.

SENATOR ROBINSON: Yeah, okay. Thanks.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Wehrbein, would you respond, please.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yes, I...I don't have a problem with that, if that's...if that's what's necessary. I...I would agree with Senator Hall, what he said earlier, that a year is kind of normal, a year to year basis. And I just want to clarify that it's not my intent to go beyond what we are doing here today to further utilize the facilities. I know there's different philosophies in here, I'm not going to come to the defense of the schools at this point, it's probably inappropriate. But this amendment simply allows us to use our facilities much like we could use them somewhere else, and that simply is all this does. I can't see that it does anymore than that. And if it...I would tell you that, if it did. But because there are not any facilities, particularly at Nebraska City, right now that could be rented out. They are down in numbers, but there's not a particularly extra facility, other than maybe a room for an occasional meeting, which is not even allowed under this point. Now they are quite restricted in what they can do. And so even to have an occasional program meeting of some sort, from an outside group, is not really allowed. So, this simply broadens up the use of the buildings, and that's all I see in this.

SENATOR LYNCH: Question.
