LB 1241

SPEAKER BAACK: The question has been called. Do I see five hands? I do. We will now vote on ceasing debate. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. We're voting on ceasing debate. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BAACK: Debate has ceased. Senator Wehrbein, to close on your amendment. Senator Wehrbein, you want to close on your amendment.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: I won't take much time, just simply to say that this is simply just to allow more utilization of the buildings if and when they are available, by space. At the present time they cannot do this at all. This simply allows it. I feel that because they fall under the Department of Education, my intent, the Department of Education would have the final say in this, because... simply because they also oversee the depart... the visually handicapped and the School for the Deaf. And so I would urge the adoption of the amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: You've heard the closing on the amendment offered by Senator Wehrbein. We will now vote on the amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on adoption of Senator Wehrbein's amendment.

SPEAKER BAACK: The amendment is adopted.

CLERK: I have nothing further to the bill at this time, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BAACK: We are now on the bill as amended. Senator Hall, did you wish to speak to the advancement?

SENATOR HALL: No.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Moore.

SENATOR MOORE: Mr. Speaker and members, I rise to support the advancement of LB 1241. Really there are two issues in LB 1241. One issue is centralizing, under the Department of
