

our decision is, do you want to go with a third year? After three years, I don't think you're any longer premature about talking on making a decision. And I think it's not premature to talk about now is the time to make the decision before you start setting an historical trend, do you really choose to put General Fund dollars in this agency. And that's one of those things you go back to when it was created and, obviously, at some point in time it was said we're not going to ask the taxpayers to fund this agency, it's something that we are going to fund ourselves with our own fees and our own sports and things like that. Unfortunately, the demand is no longer there. The argument about money being taken away, and I think Senator Hillman laid it on...hit it very well, after 15 years it's one of those things that would the money really have been here. I mean, arguably, given the demand of that agency, you know, the money likely would have been...may well have been spent. You don't know. To argue that, automatically, had we been not taking money away 15 years ago it would now be there, I guess I have trouble believing that one. Probably the best argument is that, hey, 15 years ago we helped you out, now it's time to help you out. That one, I can... I will swallow that one. That one is a tough one to argue against. To argue that, you know, if they wanted to take the money away 15 years ago, they wouldn't have this problem, I think you probably still would have the problem. Merging the agency, obviously, the Nelson administration actually proposed that this agency be merged with the Department of Economic Development to solve that problem. And if I remember right, that was brought up at the hearing, I think, these people were adamantly opposed to going and being merged with the Department of Economic Development as well. So I don't know what you merge it with. Maybe one of the more logical things would be to merge it with the Department of Health, but many of the doctors in the Department of Health have a little problem with the boxing industry as a whole and so it may be oxymoronic to put it in the Department of Health when they're going and beating their brains out. That's one of the problems there. I don't know if the Department of Health is the right place to put it either. So I don't know where you can logically put it. You don't want to put it in the Gaming Commission or the Racing Commission because you're trying to stay away from gambling, obviously. I don't know a logical place to put it. As far as dumping it on local governments, you know, one thing we could do is do away with the regulation altogether. Many states have done that. That is the way they have chosen to do that. But, at the same time, if you do that, local governments
