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roads, surely we can find room for 14.6 to send over on the education side. Surely we can find where we do have money in the state...

PRESIDENT MOUL: Time.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: ...that we can do both. I'm sorry, I didn't hear a minute. Did you give me the minute?

PRESIDENT MOUL: Yes, I did.

SENATOR BERNARD-STEVENS: Okay, I'll catch the light later, thank you.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Bernard-Stevens. Senator Lynch.

SENATOR LYNCH: I'm not going to call the question, Senator Lamb, I've got to respond to some of the rhetoric of our outstanding young senator from Seward, York and that area. He mentioned a pot of gold. I don't remember ever saying a pot of gold. I don't know about anybody else saying a pot of gold, but that's the kind of an argument somebody would raise to try to shoot down a legitimate argument by somebody else is to make it appear that they said something they really didn't, so...the only pot I know of, I walk around with all day long. But also I'd like to point out that when David Bernard-Stevens heater broke, I didn't know that, David, and the water main is in bad shape that the plumber that comes out to fix it is probably going to be making more a year than the teacher that is teaching the kids in school. Just think about that. I think the plumbers are worth it, to tell you the truth, but I think the teachers are worth a lot more. You know when we think about how we're going to find the money for Medicaid and we can't do this for the teachers because we've got the Medicaid problem on the...I hope that we can get the reports from all those consultants that the state is spending \$60 million for and get it into your hands so you can all have the obligation of reading all those reports word for word and see whether or not you think it was all worth it. And when we establish priorities around here maybe we ought to think about rather than paying people probably from out of the state 60 million bucks for consultants fees, maybe we should spend some of that on teachers and maybe some of that on Medicaid as well. There is a lot of things we're spending money on in this state, and we don't want to talk

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
