SENATOR PIRSCH: Are we still doing that then?

SENATOR COORDSEN: ...Crawford Fish Hatchery.

SENATOR PIRSCH: Yeah. I don't want to take a lot of time with each one, but I am curious as if we are still making employees live in that flood plain, then. Would you know that?

SENATOR PIRSCH: Okay. I will put my light on again unless you want to put on yours and continue making responses to those questions.
