

parts of the city in the same way. That is patent and blatant discrimination. And my job is to do what I can here to use the instrumentality of legislation to prevent that as much as possible. If I cannot totally prevent it, to mitigate it. If I can't mitigate it, make it as difficult for the city to engage in such discrimination as possible. Senator Horgan is bringing a bill to require people to ride with a seat belt strapped across them. He doesn't want the people to make their mind up about that and the people, in a vote, have already said, don't do this. But does it make Senator Horgan any difference? No, because Senator Horgan's judgment is better than that of all of the people and he's going to push his bill through. Different strokes for different folks. If this were a racially homogeneous state, many of the issues that come before the Legislature would not come at all. And some that come would not be discussed in the terms that they are discussed. If we would talk about education, we would be talking about education for all children. It would not be necessary to point out the fact that certain groups who make up a part of the population are excluded from the educating process. It is why America and South Africa are the two most racist countries in the world because they are not homogeneous in their population and there's a desire on the part of those so-called white people to discriminate and oppress those so-called black people. And that is why there is such a similarity between the two. You have shanty towns which are shacks without plumbing, without any of the amenities of modern living in South Africa and you find those same things in America.

SENATOR LAMB: Thirty seconds, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It is not because the people living in those deplorable conditions choose to do so or because their genes and chromosomes are defective or inferior, it is because they represent oppressed groups and the majority which holds the kill power, and in the case of South Africa, the minority whites who hold the kill power are insistent on enforcing their will. I will do all I can, Senator Horgan, to prevent that as much as possible from happening in this state to the people that I represent and those for whom I have a concern.

SENATOR LAMB: Time. Senator Hall.

SENATOR HALL: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members, again, I rise in support of Senator Chambers' amendment to the amendment. The
