

Highway Trust Fund, that you get yourselves into these sorts of discussions with everyone scurrying, trying to find a home or a different tax. What I would...what I am faced with, I think, at this point is, do I vote for the pop tax or do I vote for the Highway Trust Fund money. The Highway Trust Fund money is so needed in terms of a consistent flow of money and I would take argument with Senator Bernard-Stevens at every step of the way that just because they have a lot of money, it's an easy place to take the money from. That is not true, you do jeopardize programs and the programs you're going to jeopardize are the ones that are smaller. They're probably your programs that your constituents have asked you time and time again on, and they don't necessarily want to know, when are you going to fix my road, they want to know when. That's the reason we have a planned system over 20 years to address those needs, those designs and those standards, that we will address the roads, it's a matter of when. The consistent flow of money is so essential and if you are tied into, well, there's so much money, let's just take a little bit of it, look to the state budget in one year with General Funds, it is there. That is the appropriate place to do it. Now that's been philosophy, how, as a practical matter, out of this? I would suggest to you, in fact, have been doing some work on it, if you will remember,...is Senator Will anywhere? Senator Will, I hate to do this to you but you're the one that probably has that and I discussed with you briefly. At the present time, I am going to vote for the pop tax over the Highway Trust Fund money because of the severity and the poor policy, I think, it leads to. However, if I am looking for a way out of all these competing people pointing their fingers at each other, I'm looking for new sources of money. Correct? I mean, well, that's rhetorical. You don't need to answer that. That's my...
