regionalization. Regionalization will make it affordable for the citizens out here, as affordable as possible. Again, the federal government will not call us and say, we are sorry, we didn't mean it. They mean it. We have got to do it. LB 1257 is the best way to do it in a coordinated forward-thinking manner.

PRESIDENT MOUL:      One minute. Thank you, Senator Morrissey. Senator Withem.

SENATOR WITHEM:      I would call the question.

PRESIDENT MOUL:      Are there sufficient seconds? There are. We will now vote on the motion to cease debate. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted on the motion to cease debate? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK:      25 ayes, 1 nay to cease debate, Madam President.

PRESIDENT MOUL:      Debate has ceased and I will recognize Senator Johnson for closing.

SENATOR R. JOHNSON:      Thank you, Madam President and members. This is the last of the division of the question relative to the committee amendments. This would include all the sections of the bill that we have not previously voted on. We have voted on Section 33, and we voted Section 39. This last motion, basically, encompasses the rest of the Sections 1 through 63 or four, I am not sure which, but I am not opposing those. In fact, I will vote to adopt those. I still have problems with some sections of the bill, that the actions today have not alleviated that, but I, obviously, will have time to vote on this at another point. So I will try and address those concerns at a later date. But as far as these specific sections, the remainder, I support them. I would encourage the Legislature to support the remainder of the sections of the committee amendment.

PRESIDENT MOUL:      Thank you, Senator Johnson. We will now vote on this section of the committee amendments. All those in favor please vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Please record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK:      28 ayes, 1 nay, Madam President, on adoption of the balance of the committee amendments.
