

of our young people from a substance that will give them a cancer. So I would venture to say that if there were any way this bill could impact on somebody with a liquor license this bill would not pass. But it doesn't cost anybody anything, as Senator Schmit always say. It doesn't hurt anybody. It doesn't help anybody as far as those with economic interests. It's something that won't cost the Legislature anything. It's telling other people, make your body substances available for use by somebody who may have need of them so the Legislature will run lickety-split to pass a bill like this and feel good when it is passed, as it should, but these kind of gestures, and I'm not being critical of Senators Labeledz and Withem for bringing the bill, I'm glad they brought it, but the gesture as a whole by the Legislature rings hollow to me. It is not an indication of how we react in general to tragedy or to the needs of people whose needs ought to be addressed by legislation. It's something like having to come to a Christmas party where everybody is happy and having to say, but there are people who are not at the Christmas party, who don't have all of this food, who don't have a home, who are not warm, people to whom Christmas is a time of depression. But somebody has to make those points because our concerns should extend to all of those who are not able to help themselves, not to those who are just in a high profile group, where there may have been a lot of publicity about the need to address those groups, but to all of the people. As a matter of fact, those who are without friends, those who are least able to get help are the ones we ought to help the most. Where much is needed is where much ought to be given. And I understand that it is the sick rather than the well who have need of a physician...

PRESIDENT MOUL: One minute.

I'm going to support this bill and it's not difficult for me to support it at all, but I do have mixed feelings about the Legislature.
