

Commission be the hearing...

SENATOR BEYER: I think he recommends them and the Governor probably is the one that makes the actual appointments.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Who appoints the people this board that you all are setting up?

SENATOR BEYER: Secretary of State.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Who serves as a member of the board?

SENATOR BEYER: The Secretary of State is an ex officio...let's see, we have it set up with different...
