

SENATOR BEUTLER: There is no administrative procedures?

SENATOR BEYER: ...no administrative procedures set up to do anything about that person.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Well, I guess my first question would be, I am not sure if you have...I am not sure if there is not some kind of constitutional question here with regard to the delegation of powers, where we are not giving the Secretary of State any guidance whatsoever with regard to licensing. But moving on from that, an additional exceptional way of doing things here with regard to the secretary's power over educational requirements, and as I understand this bill now, we are not giving them any guidance as we ordinarily would with regard to educational requirements. For example, ordinarily when there is such a bill requiring educational standards coming before us, if for no other reason, the interest groups have taken an interest in exactly how much education is appropriate and we usually give some guidance to the secretary about educational requirements. But here, not only the licensing standards, themselves, but the educational requirements are entirely without guidance from the Legislature and at the discretion of the Secretary of State, is that not so?

SENATOR BEYER: That would be true as far as the Legislature; as far as the Secretary of State would be what the advisory board, I think it is spelled out in here, would set up as to what they would require for...

SENATOR BEUTLER: But the advisory board is just that, an advisory board. The Secretary of State can reject their advice, right?

SENATOR BEYER: I would imagine.

SENATOR BEUTLER: And besides that, the Secretary of State appoints them all, does he not?

SENATOR BEYER: Yes.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, which brings me to my third question. In my experience in almost every area where we have had an advisory board appointed...
