

SENATOR BEYER: I would hope not, but then I think...I don't see where you get the bill is sloppily drafted.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So you think it is a good idea to give one man all of this power to appoint members to the board, to set up rules and regulations, educational requirements, give the examinations, correct the examinations, determine qualifications, review whether somebody should get a license, then if they have a complaint against him, they file the complaint to him against him? Do you think that is good?

SENATOR BEYER: Well, it says any person aggrieved by the decision of the secretary may appeal the decision, and it should be in accordance with our regular Administrative Procedures Act. So there would be an overseer there.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Why should somebody have to go through the first hearing to the man they are complaining against? Why should they do that? You are going to guarantee an appeal in every case.

SENATOR BEYER: Senator Chambers, right now he is doing that, and they have that appeal procedure if he does not want to grant them the license.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Beyer, you know what I think ought to be done. Thank you. Those are all the questions that I have, and members of the Legislature, this is an attempt to regulate an entire industry.

SPEAKER BAACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I think it would be better to undertake a serious study of what ought to be done and I would be willing to participate before we start giving this kind of blanket authority to the Secretary of State. You look at all of these different groups that are exempted out of the bill probably so they would not object to it, and then say that we have now regulated an industry about which we really know nothing. I think we ought to just bracket this bill, convert the whole thing into an interim study, and do a serious and thorough looking at this profession and decide how there ought to be regulation of it. We should determine what these people will do, how they will go about doing it, any sanctions that will be imposed if they violate whatever rules there might be, consider
