

educational requirements, as well as still doing the background checks, and also an increase to the State Patrol for some kind of fee for that investigating service?

SENATOR BEYER: Right.

SENATOR FIRSCH: Sounds good to me, quite frankly, Senator Beyer. Thank you.

SPEAKER BAACK: Thank you, Senator Pirsch. Senator Beyer, you are next.

SENATOR BEYER: Mr. Speaker and colleagues, several of the answers, Senator Chambers, the Crime Commission did work on the bill along with the private investigators with the Secretary of State trying to come up with what we had hoped would be a reasonable regulation. Some of the people that were exempted out because of federal requirements, that they come under other statutes, so that is the reason they were exempted out. And, Senator Chambers, if you want a little time to ask me some more questions that I can't answer, I will give it to you.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, I can understand Senator Beyer trying to bring this bill, but I am asking the questions to show what was done who put this bill before us in not drafting a bill very well. If you all will look at the committee statement, under opponents, you see that G.L. Kuchel, representing the Crime Commission, opposed this bill. The representative sent by the Crime Commission opposed this bill. Now we do have all kind of people running around calling themselves special deputies. They carry pistols. They play like they're cops. They might accost people in parking lots if they see somebody doing something they don't think ought to be done. There are play cops all over the field. Magnum PI, the television program, may have inspired some people to see what it would take for them to get a PI after their name, and I have a different term that "private investigator" that those letters stand for but I am not going to give them on the floor of the Legislature, and it is not because they are obscene, but I don't want to distract from what we are doing here. Senator Beyer, here is a question I would ask you.
