

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Why did the Crime Commission oppose this bill?

SENATOR BEYER: Basically, if we draw back a little bit, we are not sure that he was sent by the Crime Commission to represent them. We are trying to find that out.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: All right.

SENATOR BEYER: Then he testified that he did not know anything about the bill, yet he has a letter to the professional association that, that he had written that letter to them in '85.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I am going to ask the Chairperson of the Government Committee a question. Senator Conway, would you answer a question, please?

SENATOR CONWAY: I will try.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: All right, in the committee statement under opponents, it lists G.L. Kuchel as representing the Crime Commission. Is it the committee's feeling that he did not...that he was not there as a representative of the Crime Commission?

SENATOR CONWAY: Without going back and reviewing notes and other things, all I can do is rely on...you know it was over a year ago that we had the hearing, and I don't remember the specificity in such a way, but all I can rely on is the typical accuracy of my committee clerk and that this is probably or generally the way the person presented himself and probably even signed in.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Now, Senator Beyer, I have a question to ask of you. Did you attend the hearing?

SENATOR BEYER: Yes, I did.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Why do you say that Mr. Kuchel did not represent the Crime Commission when he said that he did?

SENATOR BEYER: We don't know for sure but that is the assumption we are trying to find out from the Crime Commission
