

if he was authorized to represent them, or if he just used that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So you think Mr. Kuchel, who is a Professor of Criminal Justice at UNO came before the Government Committee, said that he represented the Crime Commission in speaking against this bill, but he may not really have been speaking with the authorization of the Crime Commission, is that what you are saying?

SENATOR BEYER: That is what we are trying to find out.

SPEAKER BAACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And if he did, in fact, do that, he would have been actually lying, wouldn't he?

SENATOR BEYER: Well, I would think so. It would be the same if I make a mistake and he was representing, yes, I'd have to say I'd have to back up too. And I am trying to rely, just like Senator Conway, on testimony that was heard over a year ago.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Have you had any dealings with Mr. Kuchel in the past?

SENATOR BEYER: No, I said before I didn't even know him.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, you don't know who he is. All right. Thank you. Members of the Legislature, I do really think in view of the discussion this morning, it is clear that this is not a good bill, and I think there ought to be a study before we would undertake a comprehensive regulation of an industry about which most of us know very little, about which the introducer of the bill knows very little, and in view of the fact that questions have been raised about the conduct of the hearing, itself, even.

SPEAKER BAACK: Time. Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Beutler. Oh, excuse me, we do have a priority motion on the desk.
