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to happen? What's Kansas doing? Was it clearly demonstrated, the shared liability, as the people supporting the out-of-state power companies and the instate power companies said for two years very clearly it is there? Now two years later, no, it is not that clear. It is not that clear. Now Kansas is saying, well, we meant it, we meant to share that liability but we sure won't put that in writing...

PRESIDENT MOUL: One minute.

SENATOR MORRISSEY: ...for you. There is a lot of questions yet to be answered, and this is the first. Again, I will remind you very clearly promised by the Governor, by the Compact Commission, itself, by the government of the State of Nebraska to their own citizens, very clearly defined by the Citizens Advisory Committee appointed early on to help guide this process. They promised it, they defined it. Let's give them that promise and live up to the word of the State of Nebraska.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Thank you, Senator Morrissey. Senator Schellpeper.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Thank you, Madam President and members. I would like to ask Senator Dierks a few questions, if I might.

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Dierks.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: Senator Dierks, as I look over this bill, and for the record, what we are attempting to do with the bill is to make sure that it is only for low-level radioactive waste site. We are not going to have a local vote on every issue that comes along, is that right?

SENATOR DIERKS: That is correct.

SENATOR SCHELLPEPER: I think sometimes that some of the people have been a little bit misled into believing that this will open it up for every issue that would come before every county and every city, and if you will look at the amendments and the bill, you will see that it is just for this one low-level radioactive site that will be in Nebraska, wherever it is in Nebraska, whether it is Boyd County, or if it is in some other county, is that right, Senator Dierks?

SENATOR DIERKS: That's right.
