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were used, from the most recently available statistic from the Department of Agriculture representing the total tonnage rather than the...rather than the actual ingredient. It's my particular opinion that if, in fact, this remains the law of the State of Nebraska then to address the issue of fairness in the next legislative session we will come back and address the actual ingredients rather than the total tonnage because it is not impacting people equally across the State of Nebraska, depending upon the type of fertilizer that they use in their occupation. So it's something that we're going to have to relook at, not from the dollar perspective, but fairness and equity. Thank you.

SENATOR LAMB: Chair recognizes Senator Nelson. Senator Nelson does not seem to be available. Senator Elmer. Senator Nelson...or Senator Elmer waives off. We have Senator Moore's light on. I think he indicated he wanted to speak on the bill. In that case we have no more speakers on Senator Warner's amendment. Senator Warner, do you wish to close? He waives closing. Senator Nelson.

SENATOR NELSON: Mr. Speaker, just for the record, and I thought...I have a question of Senator Warner again.

SENATOR LAMB: Senator Warner, would you yield.

SENATOR NELSON: The discussion on compost made me again think that maybe I better clarify this for the record. Some locations and in our area we have a lot of paunch manure that is now spread on some of the farmland that is there for fertilizer purposes. I would certainly assume, but I want this in the record, that that would not be taxed. Would you confirm that or not, Senator Warner? That's a lot of weight.

SENATOR WARNER: Senator Nelson, I believe there is, and I don't have it right here in front of me, I can get it. But as I recall there is a definition already in statute dealing with fertilizer, and as I recall specifically animal waste products, in effect, are not considered fertilizer by definition of...current definition of...of what constitutes fertilizer.

SENATOR NELSON: Thank you, Senator Warner.

SENATOR LAMB: Seeing no more speakers, Senator Warner, you still waive closing?
