

would see what it is, and it is fairly easy to understand, and I know that is why some individuals will be opposed to it. The problem is is that there are advantages to those folks right now who own those luxury vehicles, depending on where they happen to live, depending on what the levy happens to be with regard to personal property depending upon the county that they reside in, or, at least, the one that they register their car in. I happen to live in Douglas County and we have a number of folks who own property just outside of Douglas County and plate their car at a lake cabin that they may own for purposes of having a reduced rate in terms of what they pay on their personal property and their vehicle. It is not uncommon at all to see a number of Cass County plates parked in driveways in Douglas County. Those folks own property and their argument is that that's the primary place of at least registration for that vehicle. That clearly is a question to be answered. What 1135 does, and the reason for the arguments against it, are that it means that across the board in terms of the valuation of cars, and the fee schedule that would be put in place, all cars of every type, would be dealt with in the same manner, so that you wouldn't have those discrepancies that currently exist amongst a new car that happened to be in Douglas County as opposed to a new car, for example, that would be in Cass County or Red Willow County, and that is the essence of what 1135 does. What I would like to do also is echo Senator Conway's comments. There is this amendment to the committee amendments, and there is another technical amendment that need to be adopted. We can talk about them each individually or talk about the committee amendments once they are in final form, or adopted to the bill. It makes no matter, but there is at least one other technical amendment after this that needs to be put on the bill if it is going to move across to Select File. Thank you.

SPEAKER BAACK: Senator Conway, you are next on the amendment.

SENATOR CONWAY: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members. The amendment, again like I say, hopefully can be adopted so that we all are talking about the same particulars in front of us that are worthy of debate, and I think, as Senator Chambers asked Senator Hall the question associated with the situation under this bill, one of the things that I would like to enter into debate as we get to discussing it is the unfairness and the inappropriateness of our current system, and that is what led to my interest in looking for a change, and how this may or may not compare with our current system in attempt to make a change that
