

to Senator Chambers that his folks would probably do better on this bill, I'm wondering if the shift isn't from rich to poor, where is that shift if the bill raises actually more money and maybe I'm wrong, but it seems to me then the shift is out into the country from Douglas County out into the country and that makes me uncomfortable with the bill. And then Senator Byars tries to do something really good with the bill. So I'm going to have to sit back I guess and listen some more because I can see what Senator Conway and Senator Hall are trying to do. Over the life of a car or ten years of ownership of a car you'll save money on a mid-priced car and you'll be able to pay less up front and I understand that. But the fact is I just can't afford to buy a new car, can't even think about it, not alone the taxes, not just the taxes and the sales tax, but just the base price right now is kind of, is more than I paid for my house when I bought my house and that's just a little scary because I don't think I want to do a 30-year loan on a car. And I don't think a lot of my folks in the district are buying a lot of new cars. I know we, Continental Oil, this is another reason I've always had a good love for big business. Conoco, that my brother and mother run a gas station have a big cleanup program going on, clean up your station, we don't care what kind of service you provide, you have to have an image, you have to have that image, corporate image. So they took, they came by and took a picture of my brother's gas station and sent him back a letter with a copy of that picture and said to get up to the corporate image you're going to have to haul off all those junk cars. Well, that's all well and good and fortunately all those junk cars were our customers and if we told them they couldn't bring their cars to the gas station, we'd probably lose a lot of business. I'm uncomfortable with the bill. I'll sit back and listen now that Senator Byars is trying to do his amendment, but I'm unsure how the shift of the funding goes and where that, how that'll all work out and I guess I'll just stay neutral now and look at some numbers and make my decision a little later.
