Oh, yes, and Senator Bernard-Stevens speaks over and over again about this, it's a political thing, it's the outside lobby, those awful people behind the glass wall there, those terrible people that make all these decisions. He's not here right now, I see him over there. And he speaks very well, too. He must be in seventh heaven today because he speaks so well, and he has a chance to speak at every...how many times do you speak, three times on an amendment? Senator Bernard-Stevens was very happy speaking on this amendment. But nobody said anything about choice when it came to LB 78. Those people behind the glass wall had nothing to do with that, did they? I mean, all the men senators here who fell off LB 78, the consent vote, no, were they voting their conscience? No, they weren't voting their conscience. They were voting the lobby out there behind those glass walls, and I could...I would like to mention their names on the floor right now, but I won't do it.
