SENATOR CHAMBERS: Then let me say this and, Madam President, I've got to do this on a point of personal privilege if necessary. I will agree to answer a question, but I'm not going to be cut off in the middle of it.

SENATOR ROBAK: I think he is talking on my time and I don't think this is a point of personal privilege. This is my time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I...

SENATOR ROBAK: Madam President, is this my time? Is this my time?

PRESIDENT MOUL: Senator Chambers, I will take your point up after Senator Robak has completed her time.

SENATOR ROBAK: Thank you, Madam Speak...President. Do you know how much time I have left?

PRESIDENT MOUL: You have a minute and a half.

SENATOR ROBAK: Minute and a half, okay. I think the issue here is that we are not debating LB 78. For some reason, we have got on to some issue that some men out here are thinking that women, if some reason they make some decision that the men don't like, are inferior. Yeah, I guess that's right. I guess that's right. Every day they tell us that in some subtle way that we're inferior because, you know, just read the Legislative Update. Legislature gives final approval. It's all men there. How many women were ever included in anything? So we're inferior...we are inferior, Senator Chambers. We're very inferior and I don't mean that just because I vote pro-life that, you know, I...I would agree with you that I'm inferior because of that. I'm inferior because we're women on the body. That's why we're inferior. But my point to you is, Senator Chambers, you do like to read because we've discussed this many times, but you always claim you don't have time to read. Sir, I would advise you to read this book and then come back and tell me all the things that you've said on the body today about women. Thank you.

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
